


Hi Petrolia!

Behind-the-Scenes Rural Physician Recruitment

Did you know there is a group of dedicated community volunteers and health care administration professionals that focus on recruiting and retaining primary care physicians for Petrolia and Central Lambton?

The committee operates out of the Central Lambton Family Health Team and is funded by small grants from the eight municipalities that make up Central Lambton. The group was first started in 2011 by the members of Charlotte's Task Force — and was formed in response to staffing concerns in maintaining daily operations of Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital (CEEH) of Bluewater Health's Emergency Department.

Working in partnership with the CEEH Foundation, the committee has successfully signed eight primary care physicians to the Central Lambton Family Health Team, including Dr. Ahmed Hijazi (pictured here) who was successfully recruited in the summer of 2021.

Members of the Central Lambton Recruitment Committee include Rosanne Orcutt (Chair), Sarah Milner, Owen Byers, Debbie Freeman, Alison Mahon, Mark Braet, Judi McCallum, Lonny Napper, Nick Salaris, and Jill Edwards.



The work of this group is helping to maintain rural access to primary and emergency care for the residents of Petrolia and Central Lambton. Thank you for your dedication to your community!



Winter Weather Tips Winter weather causes challenges for residents and waste collection crews. Please follow these guidelines to make collection safe, easy, and efficient for all. Collection crews begin curbside collection at 7 a.m. Please have all items at the curb before 7 a.m. on your service day. Winter weather may require collection routes to change, resulting in earlier pickup times. **During snow events,** make sure your blue boxes and items are visible to drivers and safe to access - place all items in a shoveled area on your driveway or on the ground, NOT on snowbanks. Drivers do their best to complete their routes, although there may be delays due to road and weather conditions. Please check with your municipal

Keep your drivers safe. Collection crews are not permitted to climb snowbanks to retrieve blue boxes or waste bags. Pace items at the end of your shoveled driveway or

Follow these tips to keep materials in your blue boxes and not litter the streets

shovel a shelf for your blue boxes and waste containers

website for updates during severe weather.

- Stack the blue bin containing heavier recyclable materials like glass bottles and jars on top of your blue box filled with loose papers/fibers
- . Don't fill your blue box above the rim fill a second and third box with recyclable materials
- On really windy days, wait to put your blue boxes out for collection until the following week to prevent litter.
- Blue boxes may blow away when empty, so please take a look around your neighborhood if your blue box is missing on a windy day.



Broken Blue Box - If your box freezes to the ground or the plastic cracks due to the cold, please replace and keep it free from ice to ensure collection

Write your address on your blue boxes, green bin, and garbage can in permanent marker so they can be returned if blown away during winter weather. This makes it easier for them

Thank you for keeping our community clean and drivers safe.





WINTER MAINTENANCE NOTICE

Snow Removal

- Under the Highway Traffic Act Section 181 Deposit of snow on Roadway, states that "No person shall deposit snow or ice on a roadway without permission in writing to do so from the Ministry of Transportation or the road authority responsible for the maintenance of the road."
- This generally applies to the snow that accumulates in laneways from precipitation and from private or municipal snow plowing operations, those who insist on plowing snow from private property onto public roads can be fined

Overnight Parking

- Residents are reminded there is no overnight parking on Town streets between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- This allows for the Town's Road Crews to plow the roads safely and efficiently, we ask that you please abide by the by-law and be considerate of the road crews when they are out doing their best to keep our roads open and in safe condition

Parking on roadway

· Under the Highway Traffic Act Section 170.

Vehicles interfering with traffic

(12) Despite the other provisions of this section, no person shall park or stand a vehicle on a highway in such a manner as to interfere with the movement of traffic or the clearing of snow from the highway. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.S., 170 (12).

- Under By-Law Business owners are required to maintain the front area of their storefront, this includes the removal of snow
 The Sidewalk Plow will make its way through Town once permittable, Roads are the priority for Works

PREVENT FOG (FATS, OIL and GREASE) in our sewers

What is FOG?

FOG (Fats, Oil and Grease) is the most common cause of sewer back-ups. FOG is a by-product of cooking and can be found in butter, margarine, salad dressing, gravies, sauces, lard, shortening, baking goods, meat fats and

THREE

Did you know the sewer system is only designed for the 3 P's?

1. Pee 2. Poo 3. Paper (toilet paper)

- collect used grease and cooking oil in a container and dispose of it in the garbage
- wipe out visible fats, oil, grease and food residue from dishes, pots and pans with disposable paper towels
- put solid waste and food scraps in the garbage
- be aware of hidden FOG's in salad dressing, sauces, gravies, cheese and desserts
- use a strainer in the sink to remove excess food debris encourage neighbours to keep FOG's out of the sewer



- pour oil and grease down the sink, drain or toilet
- scrape food scraps down the sink, drain or toilet
- pour liquid food down the sink, drain or toilet
- run hot water over greasy dishes or pans the FOG will cool and stick to the inside of the pipes use a food waste grinder to get rid of food and grease
- use washable cloths to wipes greasy dishes clean

CAO's Corner

Municipal Property Taxes – Part 1

Hello everyone! I hope you are finding my CAO's Corner articles interesting and informative. I know that municipal government plays many important aspects in our daily lives and that municipal affairs can sometimes seem complicated and foreign which can lead to misunderstandings. The purpose of my articles is to help demystify municipal government and reduce confusion.

Today, I will explain how municipal property taxes work. Property taxes are simply Property Assessment multiplied by the Property Tax Rate <u>equals Taxes Payable</u>. To fully comprehend how it works, you need to understand the following key points:

Property assessments are provided by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC for short). MPAC is a provincial organization that provides the current value assessment of over 5 million properties in our province to Ontario municipalities. The assessed value of these properties is over \$3 trillion.

Your municipal taxes are comprised of an Education portion (we have 4 School Boards); a Lambton County portion; and a portion for the Town of Petrolia. Annually, the province sets the province-wide Education rate. Town staff calculate the amount payable for school taxes for each property. Staff send the taxes collected on their behalf to our four School Boards throughout the year. Lambton County Council sets its property tax rate annually. Town staff calculate the amount payable to the County for each property. Staff pay our County throughout the year. Petrolia Town Council sets the annual (lower tier) tax rate which is used to fund our local municipal services, excluding water and sewer.

There are many unique and complicated aspects to our provincial property tax system which I will not cover in my CAO's Corner articles, but I am glad to discuss and/or suggest where you can get more information. For example, you may wish to Google MPAC and browse through their website. MPAC has greatly improved the readability of their website over the past few years. MPAC's website has some great online property assessment videos. They also offer a free online service that is password protected that provides residential property owners with comparative assessment data for your neighbourhood. Their system is called "AboutMyProperty".

Part II of Municipal Property Taxes will explain the current freeze on property assessments and what will happen when the province lifts this freeze.
